10th March 2024 — Year B — 4th Sunday of Lent

My dear brothers and sisters,

In today's Gospel passage from John 9:1-41, we encounter Jesus as the light of life and the light of the world. His words, "As long as I am in the world, I am the light of the world," reveal the profound truth of His divine presence among us as well as the transformative power of encountering Him that cause us to see.

Jesus' encounter with the blind man illustrates two essential aspects of our relationship with Him: touching and listening/hearing. Jesus, the Light, touches the eyes of the blind man with clay and instructs him to wash in the Pool of Siloam. Through this physical act, the blind man receives not only physical sight but also spiritual insight into the reality of Jesus as the Messiah.

We live in a world shrouded in darkness, both external and internal. Like the blind man, we carry within us the darkness of hatred, prejudice, fear and selfishness. We are often blinded by the false allure of material possessions and the illusion of security they provide. Moreover, many are blind to their own sinfulness and the need for God's mercy and grace in their lives.

Despite the depth of darkness and blindness that envelop us, Jesus comes to us daily as the light, offering to lead us out of darkness into His marvellous Light. He penetrates the darkness of our hearts and minds, offering us the gift of new sight and spiritual renewal. However, this transformation can only be complete if we willingly follow Him and allow His light to illuminate our path.

Jesus comes to us in a special way through the sacraments, particularly the Eucharist and the sacrament of reconciliation. In the Eucharist, He offers Himself to us as the bread of life, nourishing our souls and filling us with His grace. Through the sacrament of reconciliation, He washes away our sins and restores us to spiritual wholeness.

Just as the blind man listened to Jesus and followed His instructions, we too are called to heed His voice and respond in faith. We are called to go forth into the world, bearing the light of Christ to our families, friends and communities. Through our words and actions, we become beacons of joy, healing and love, reflecting the light of Christ to all those we encounter.

This Gospel passage reminds us that Jesus is the true Light of the world and the source of our life. If we shut Him out of our lives, we remain in darkness. He has come to heal us of our spiritual blindness and to lead us into the fullness of His light.

As we continue our Lenten journey, may we open our hearts to the transforming power of Christ's light and allow Him to lead us out of darkness into the radiant splendour of His love. Let us reflect on the words of St Paul in the second reading - Eph 5:8, "For you were once darkness, but now you are light in the Lord. Live as Children of the light." In our life actions and relationships, when we start to love as Jesus did, to care for others and work for the kingdom of God, then we can say 'Now I can see'.

May God bless you abundantly. Amen. Fr Ihemelandu Uzuegbu



The season of Lent involves a time of deeper examination and preparation for the Elect, who are participating in the Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults (RCIA), and hopefully for those of us already living the Catholic faith. Though the Scrutinies are meant for the RCIA Elect, they can help all Catholics seeking to live a life of continual conversion. The Scrutinies are three rites that help prepare the Elect to enter the Catholic Church. These take place during the period of RCIA formation known as Purification and Enlightenment, towards the end of the Elects' formation.

The purpose of the Scrutinies is "to uncover, then heal all that is weak, defective, or sinful" in the hearts of the Elect and to "strengthen all that is upright, strong, and good" (Quotes from Ritual Text for Rite of Christian Initiation for Adults, paragraph #141). Though the word "scrutinise" sounds rather Intimidating — sort of negative, the true meaning is just "to see clearly or inspect closely." The Scrutinies are about seeing sin in its right aspect, and coming to understand the way we fall victim to it. They are also about the transformative healing possible for us through Christ, as He offers Himself to us.

Once we see sin for what it is, and understand our own personal weaknesses, we can begin to exercise the freedom we have received through Jesus. With God's grace, we can turn away from the darkness of sin, reject disordered patterns, and step into the light. This is possible for us because we believe in the redemptive sacrifice of Christ, and we entrust ourselves to Him.

During the three-week period of the Scrutinies, the Elect open the eyes of their souls, examine carefully how sin works in their lives, and make the deliberate choice to turn away from sin so they can step joyfully into the light of Christ at their Baptisms. The Scrutinies are associated with three specific Gospel stories on

The Scrutinies are associated with three specific Gospel stories on the third, fourth and fifth Sundays of Lent:

- Jesus encountering the Samaritan woman at the well, where He offers Himself as the Living Water
- Jesus healing the man born blind, where He gives Himself as Light of the World
- Jesus raising Lazarus from the dead, where He reveals Himself as the Resurrection and the Life.

After the Gospel and Homily, the Elect and their Godparents come forward during each of the three weeks of the Scrutinies. The Priest addresses the whole assembly, asking us to pray for a spirit of repentance, for an awareness of sin and for strength of will for the Elect.

The Priest then lays hands on each of the Elect individually, and he prays silently over them. Among other intentions, he prays an exorcism prayer, asking God to strengthen and protect them from temptation and deceit.

The process of awareness, healing and strengthening takes time and repeated prayer. The Ritual Text says the purpose of the Scrutinies is to *uncover, heal, and then strengthen*. Perhaps that is the symbolic reason behind the three weeks of Scrutinies.


