



True Love Is A Debt All Of Us Owe

In the second reading, St Paul says; "Owe no one anything, except mutual love... Love your Neighbour as yourself. Love does no wrong to a Neighbour; therefore, love is the fulfilling of the law."

Here St Paul simply reiterated what Jesus had commanded everyone to do in Matthew 22:36-40, which was inspired by "The Shema" of the old testament (Deut. 6:4-9): "A man came to Jesus and asked Him: Teacher, which is the greatest commandment in the Law?' Jesus replied: 'Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind.' This is the First and greatest commandment. And the second is like it: 'Love your Neighbour as yourself.' All the Law and the Prophets hang on these two commandments."

In alluding to the instruction of Jesus, St Paul persuasively encouraged members of the Roman community to let their faith transcend rhetoric and become practical and complete in their love.

We all desire to be loved, but do we love others as much too? From what is happening in our world today some people talk of love when it suits them but not when the demands of love challenge them. When Jesus summarised the commandments as Love, what actually does it practically mean in my everyday live? From what Jesus said, we can see that love actual begins with "Loving God above every other thing or person". It also implies that any love that does not put God and His words first is incomplete and will amount to us building a house on a shaky foundation. On the other hand, when our love is devoid of human touch, compassion and care, it becomes an empty wishful utopia. We can do both through the power of the Holy Spirit.

The teaching here is that true love goes deeper than emotion and cannot be reduced to mere feeling without moral compass. True love must be driven by life led by the Holy Spirit. That was why Jesus told His disciples that practical love for God is shown in obedience to God. In Jn. 14:15,

23 -24, He said: "If you love me keep my commands... obey my teachings". It teaches us that love is intertwined with forgiveness and fairness. True love is a debt that all of us owe to each other

The proposed Indigenous Voice to Parliament

Background to the Uluru Statement from the Heart and proposed Indigenous Voice to Parliament

Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Peoples have lived in this land for many thousands of years, their cultural and spiritual connection to country expressed through their history, music, language, songs, art and dancing. Their custodianship is not recognised in the Australian Constitution, and a constitutionally enshrined Indigenous Voice to Parliament is proposed as a way to achieve this. This proposal was requested by those who gathered at Uluru and presented the Uluru Statement from the Heart in 2021. The Uluru Statement has been endorsed by all levels of Catholic leadership, including the Australian Catholic Bishops Conference and His Grace Archbishop Mark Coleridge.

What can you do? Please prayerfully consider your own position

Archbishop Mark certainly acknowledges that every Catholic should and will come to their own conclusions about their response to social issues such as this one. His statements on matters such as this are made in order to encourage the Catholic community to reflect on the Church's views on specific issues, not to mandate their response. The Archbishop fully respects that you will form your own conscience and make your own decision regarding this referendum.

All Catholics are urged to engage in the debate productively, respecting each other and accepting that people may, in good faith, have differing concerns and perspectives.

Another important step you can take is to read the information available for both sides of the debate so that you can make your own informed decision on how you might vote in the referendum. The conversations about reconciliation are sometimes difficult and there are many considerations in this complex situation. Please also remember our Indigenous brothers and sisters in prayer during this time.

ARE YOU SOMEONE OR DO YOU KNOW SOMEONE WHO

- * Has expressed an interest in becoming a Catholic?
- * Has been Baptised in another faith and would like to learn about the Catholic faith?
- * Has a child over the age of eight who has not been Baptised?
- * Was baptised Catholic as a child, but has not celebrated the Sacraments of Confirmation and Eucharist?

We offer you an opportunity to meet in a tiny group to learn more about our faith. The sessions focus on the teachings and experience of Church, and prepare individuals to celebrate the Sacraments of Baptism, Confirmation, and Eucharist during the Easter season. There are separate sessions for children or youth.

Becoming Catholic means undertaking a spiritual journey. This will normally take about 6-9 months depending on the readiness of each individual. It is called Christian Initiation and there are ceremonies or 'Rites' at each stage to mark the steps along the way. The whole journey is called the 'Rites of Christian Initiation of Adults' or RCIA for short.

The RCIA is the process established for the Universal Church for individuals to become Catholic and receive the Sacraments of Initiation - Baptism, Confirmation and Eucharist. The RCIA is centred on fostering a deep relationship with Jesus and the Church that He founded. The journey is a gradual process of realising God's call and becoming aware of God's presence in your life. This would be through a series of conversations and it is okay to ask for, and enquire about, more information and clarification at any stage of this journey of initiation into the Christian Catholic Faith Community. This journey takes place through distinct phases over a period of time suitable for the participant, through weekly learning sessions, meeting the Parish community, attending Mass and gaining an understanding of the Faith life of Catholic faithful.

The RCIA process is a restoration of the ancient catechumenate, arising within the first three centuries following the Era of the Apostles. The beginning of this process is called the Catechumenate. This will ultimately lead you to receive the Sacraments of Initiation: Baptism, Confirmation and Communion. If, however, you have already been baptised in another Christian tradition, you will be following a slightly different process of continuing conversion leading up to Reception (not Baptism), Confirmation and First Communion.

The culmination of all these preparations is celebrated with the whole community at Mass on the Easter Vigil where you will be receiving the Sacraments of Initiation.

The RCIA programme results in your becoming part of a community of faith: hence you will be accompanied along the way by the RCIA team who will share with you their own Faith.
