11th February 2024 — Year B — 6th Sunday of Ordinary Time

Dear Sisters and Brothers,

The readings of this Sunday, especially the first and gospel readings, tell us stories about lepers. They are a group of people before and during the time of Jesus who were the untouchables and were inhumanely discriminated upon.

But in the gospel, Mark 1:40-45, we encounter a profound moment where Jesus heals a leper, an act that transcends mere physical restoration and delves into the depths of cultural and spiritual healing and transformation. Mark's Gospel passage, central to our reflection on this 6th Sunday in Ordinary Time Year B, challenges us to re-evaluate our perceptions of societal norms and embrace the radical inclusivity exemplified by Jesus.

Who are the people – the untouchables in your life?

Jesus' encounter with the leper is not merely a demonstration of His divinity, but a profound statement on the power of compassion and the dismantling of societal barriers. In reaching out to touch the leper, Jesus defies cultural taboo, stereotype, and religious conventions, affirming the inherent dignity and worth of every individual, regardless of their perceived status or condition.

The significance of Jesus' action lies not only in the physical healing of the leper but also in the relational healing that takes place. By touching the untouchable, Jesus not only restores the leper's health but also restores his sense of belonging within the community. However, in doing so, Jesus Himself becomes an outsider, highlighting the radical nature of His Inclusive love.

Dear friends, as we reflect on this Gospel passage, we are challenged to examine our own attitudes towards those whom society deems as 'untouchable' or marginalised. Who are the individuals or groups that we tend to overlook or exclude? Who are the ones in our midst who long for acceptance and compassion?

Jesus' example compels us to break down the barriers of prejudice and discrimination, to extend a hand of welcome and inclusion to all who are marginalised or ostracised. Like Jesus, we are called to embrace the outcast, to stand in solidarity with the marginalised, and to advocate for justice and equality in our communities.

In a world marked by division and exclusion, the Gospel message of radical love and inclusivity shines as a beacon of hope. We are called to be light of hope for others, let our light shine onto others Mt 5:14-16. As followers of Christ, we are called to embody this love in our words and actions, to create spaces of belonging and acceptance where all are valued and respected.

May we heed the call of Jesus to embrace the 'untouchables' of 'our' world, to extend compassion and hospitality to all, and to work tirelessly for the establishment of God's kingdom of love and justice here on earth. Amen.

LENT begins on ASH WEDNESDAY

Lent is a time of preparation for Easter - forty days of preparation. Lent means waiting - for the cross. God does not need Lent, but we do. The elements of fasting and feasting tap into some of our spiritual needs, where denial creates longings to be filled with the appreciation of God's great gifts.

The name "Ash Wednesday" is derived from the practice of placing ashes on the foreheads of believers in the shape of a cross. The ashes are typically obtained by burning the palms blessed on the previous year's Palm Sunday. The imposition of ashes is often accompanied by the words "Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return," emphasising mortality and the need for repentance.

The tradition of the start of Lent has been documented for centuries (see sources below). The source states as early as 1000AD, "In the week immediately before Lent everyone shall go to his confessor and confess his deeds and the confessor shall so shrive [hears confession and administers penance] him as he then may hear by his deeds what he is to do in the way of penance". Later on and continuing for many centuries, the celebration of Shrovetide was a tradition in many societies. This celebration includes eating pancakes or other foods made with the butter, flour and eggs that would need to be used up before the beginning of Lent. Along with its emphasis on feasting, another theme of Shrove Tuesday involves Christians repenting for their sins in preparation for Lent in the Christian liturgical calendar. In many Christian churches, both Protestant and Roman Catholic, a popular Shrove Tuesday tradition is the ringing of the church bells (on this day, the toll is known as the Shriving Bell) "to call people to confession for the season of Lent".

The fact that Lent lasts approximately 40 days is no accident, as the number 40 in Scripture is significant. Biblical events grouped by 40 represent a period of testing of faithful people, and put God first in spite of tests and trials. We see examples of the number 40 in the Israelites' 40 years of wandering in the desert before entering the Promised Land (*Numbers 14*), and, most importantly, in the 40 days Jesus spent fasting and facing temptation in the wilderness before embarking on His public ministry (*Matthew 4:1-11*).

Lent is also a time for preparing catechumens (i.e., baptismal candidates for Easter baptism) and candidates (i.e., those preparing to celebrate Confirmation and First Communion). It has its origins in the fact that preparation of catechumens is a process by which the whole Christian community is renewed.

So, Ash Wednesday is a solemn reminder of human mortality and the need for reconciliation with God. It marks the beginning of the penitential Lenten season.
