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
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# Kedron Brook Catholic Community embracing the parishes of Good Samaritan & St John the Baptist Joined in joyfully praising and worshipping God



13th August 2023—19th Sunday Ordinary Time—Year A

Dear Sisters and Brothers,

After the death of King Solomon as the Lord declared, the kingdom of Israel divided into the northern and southern kingdoms. Faith in one supreme God - Yahweh - was eroded, and the people took to the worshipping of false gods. This came to an alarming stage when Ahab, the 7th king of Israel (869-850 BC) married Jezebel, the daughter of the pagan king of Tyre. Ahab allowed her to build a temple for her god, Baal, and took part himself in idol worship and immorality. This contributed to turning the hearts of many in Israel away from Yahweh.

In 1 Kgs. 18:16-40 we see how Elijah, one of the servants of God, was sent to warn the people to change from their evil ways. Elijah challenged the 450 prophets of Baal to a contest to settle definitively the debate on the true religion and on who the supreme living God is – Yahweh or Baal. This took place on Mount Carmel. The prophets of Baal were to prepare a sacrifice without setting fire to it, same with Elijah. The true God is to answer by fire. The prophets of Baal tried unsuccessfully for hours. Afterwards prophet Elijah prepared his own altar of sacrifice with twelve stones standing for the tribes of Israel. He asked the people to pour water on the offering until the altar was drenched. Elijah called upon Yahweh and God answered with fire and consumed all the offering.

The victory led to the execution of the prophets of Baal. At this Elijah incurred the wrath of Queen Jezebel, who hunted him to kill him. Elijah ran away and sheltered in a cave on Mount Horeb. This sets the background for the first reading of today: "Then the LORD said, "Go outside and stand on the mountain before the LORD; the LORD will be passing by." A great surprise to Elijah, the Lord is not in the strong and mighty wind, the earthquake, or the fire, but rather in the gentle whisper sound. This became a lesson for prophet Elijah that God is everywhere and cannot be confined to a particular space or event. Again, God's way is different from our ways. God's way is as gentle as a breeze.

The reading teaches us about faith in God. Elijah's incredible faith in God led him to a successful challenge against the prophets of Baal. This same faith is what Jesus called on his disciples and on us to have. In the gospel, Peter in faith stepped out of the boat not minding the storms and waves of the sea. But Peter lost it as he was walking on the sea because he took his eyes away from Jesus. When faced with challenges and the storms of life, let us call on Jesus and keep our focus and gaze on Him and we will not drown in the sea of life.

## Altar Serving at Church

After Confirmation in late July, after a campaign for Altar Servers, Father Iheme trained and spoke about Altar serving to nine boys and girls. We had two training sessions where we had six new Altar Servers at St Columba's and three Altar Servers at St John The Baptist who were welcomed into traineeship of Altar Serving. We welcome Amelia, Ben, Daniel, Georgia, Henry, Kingston, Lillian, Owen, and Zachary.

An Altar Server is a lay assistant to the priest during mass, he or she is commonly called an Altar boy or Altar girl. An Altar Server attends to supporting tasks at the Altar such as fetching and carrying, ringing the bell, helping in bringing up the gifts, bringing up the book, among other things.

Firstly, they were shown their attire - they wear an Alb and a cincture. Father tutored the children on the proper terms for the attire but after many different versions of the word - *cincture*, Father decided on calling it something easier. For simplicity's sake they called them a "robe" and a "rope". Perhaps you have already noticed the "newbies" in their robe and rope serving up at the altar.

Some of the tasks that the little Altar Servers learnt were how to hold the liturgical books for the priest when he is not at the altar and is proclaiming the prayers with outstretched hands. They bring and hold such things as books, the lavabo water and towel, vessels to hold the consecrated bread, and even how to hold up the electronic candles for the Gospel reading.

They also learnt to process in with the cross... if they are old enough or big enough to hold up the processional crucifix. They all had a turn at carrying the processional crucifix, processing in and bowing at the Altar. There was such excitement about learning the important ways they can serve at the Altar.

One or more servers assist in arranging the corporal, the purificator(s), the chalice(s), the pall(s), and the Missal on the altar, leaving it to the senior Altar Server to take care of the sacred vessels. There were many new terms to learn!

If the bread and wine for the Mass are presented by the faithful, the altar servers assist the priest who receives the gifts and then they help to put these on the altar. They present the cruets of wine and water to the priest to pour some into the chalice. When the priest washes his hands standing at the side of the altar, a server pours the water over them. They also all had a turn with holding the bowl for hand washing, handing the towel to Father and handing him the cruets, the Paten and the Chalice.

At Consecration, they also learnt that an Altar Server rings a bell shortly before the consecration, generally when the epiclesis happens (when the priest extends his hands above the gifts). In accordance with our church custom, an altar server also rings the bell when, after the consecrations of the bread and wine, the priest raises the Host and then the Chalice. With many versions of ringing, strength, intensity and amplification, there is still much handeye, fine and gross motor skills and coordination needing practice when ringing the bells. The bell is not an ordinary bell.

At the Recessional, the altar servers also learnt that they lead the priest in a similar fashion to the entrance procession. It won't be long until you see these little trainees become proficient at their job. Congratulate them when you see them and give them a "thumbs up" for a good job
