17th December 2023—3rd Sunday of Advent—Year B

Dear Sisters and Brothers,

The readings of the 3rd Sunday of Advent year B have the common themes of joy and encouragement. They tell us that our salvation is near and call us to rejoice. Intentionally this Sunday is called the "Gaudete Sunday", which means the Sunday to rejoice. This is because amid the confusion and challenges of life, the rebirth and presence of Christ in one's life is the only thing that guarantees enduring and complete happiness and peace (Jn 16:33). Furthermore, it is called Gaudete Sunday because, in the beginning of the original Latin text for today's Mass, we have the opening antiphon: "Gaudete in Domino semper" - "Rejoice in the Lord always." With this, the church welcomes the third Sunday and reminds us that we are gradually coming to the threshold of our preparation for the very joyful occasion of the birth of Jesus. Today we light the rose candle in the Advent wreath, and the priest may wear rose vestments, worn only this day and the 4th Sunday of lent. In the first reading from Is.61:1-2,10-11, we heard Prophet Isaiah encouraging the Jewish exiles returning from Babylon to rejoice because "Yahweh", their God, is their strong Guide, Provider and Protector. "I exult for joy in the Lord, my soul rejoices in my God, for he has clothed me with the garment of salvation". Here we see that reason for the rejoicing is not due to material success but something more tangible – the abiding presence of the Lord in Isaiah's life. The same is seen in today's Responsorial Psalm (Luke 1:46 ff.), again Mary rejoices in the great blessing given to her, exclaiming: "My soul glorifies the Lord; my spirit finds joy in God my Saviour."

St Paul, picked up on this too in the second reading as he advised the Thessalonian Christians to "rejoice always". He framed the rejoicing as human effort in leading blameless, holy and thankful lives guided by the Holy Spirit as they wait for Christ's second coming that is near. The questions are then: how can we have this joy even amid the numerous problems in life and the world? What is the basis of your joy in life?

Let us have it in our mind that Paul was not talking about emotion; emotion fluctuates and is not steady. It is like the wind or the tide of the wave, sometimes there is a low tide and other times a high tide, and no one can control one's emotion; but one can make a decision to be happy, to rejoice, whether the tide of life is at its peak or its lowest point.

Paul is calling us to make a decision of the will, which is a decision to let Christ be the centre of our life.

Material success, like wealth, jobs, beauty and validation from people can bring momentary joy, but they do not last nor guarantee peace. However, the presence of God in one, with its righteousness does. My dear friends, we are called to embrace the faith we have received, the love that Christ has offered and the promised hope of eternal life as we prepare for Christ's Second Coming. St John the forerunner of Jesus has shown us the way in humility. He assures us that it is the way to happiness. Let us make room for Christ in our lives and we will be happy and at peace.

KBCC Solidarity with the Catholic Parish of St Therese, Kiritimati, Republic of Kiribati

Dear brothers and sisters in the Lord, I would like to inform you that our community, Kedron Brook Catholic Community, has decided to journey in solidarity with the Kiritimati Catholic Parish Project on Kiritimati. This community is one of our closest neighbours in the Pacific region. In a letter from Father Tara-jake Takakia, who looks after the church, the parish is appealing to groups and individuals to support their Parish Project on Ronton Kiritimati. The project is to erect some Eco-friendly single house units or Bungalows (called Little Flower Guest House) over the lagoon in Ronton, which will serve as guest houses for tourists or fish anglers. If this dream is realised, it will be a source of revenue for the Kiritimati Parish Catholic Church. It will also provide employment opportunities to the people who will work as tour guides, boatmen, cleaners, chefs and drivers.

The first phase of the project is to construct the first five units of the "Guest House" estimated to cost \$120,000 AUD. The Catholic Parish in Kiritimati has saved \$20,000 AUD and is seeking interested donors and supporters to come to their aid to make the dream a reality by 2024-2025. As a parish community, our combined Pastoral Council, with the support of the Finance Councils, has agreed to support this endeavour and raise at least \$10,000 AUD in 2024. As a result, all money raised in our Christmas raffles will go to this project. Also, we are looking at other ways of raising the money and would appreciate donations to the Kiritimati appeal fund. *Fr Iheme*

The Pink Candle in the Advent Wreath

Advent, which begins the Church's liturgical year, began on Sunday, December 3. Advent lasts the four Sundays (also weekdays) leading up to the celebration of Christmas. The Advent season is a time of preparation for our hearts and minds for the Lord's birth on Christmas.

The wreath and candles are full of symbolism tied to the Christmas season. The circle of the wreath, which has no beginning or end, symbolises the eternity of God, the immortality of the soul, and the everlasting life we find in Christ. The individual evergreens that make up the wreath have their own meanings. The pine, holly, and yew signify immortality and the cedar signifies strength and healing. The pine cones that decorate the wreath symbolize life and resurrection.

The four candles represent the four weeks of Advent, and one candle is lit each Sunday. Three of the candles are purple because it is a liturgical colour that signifies a time of prayer, penance, and sacrifice.

The third candle is pink and symbolizes joy. It is called the "Shepherd's Candle," and is pink because rose is a liturgical colour for joy. The third Sunday of Advent is Gaudete Sunday and it reminds us of the joy that the world experienced at the birth of Jesus, as well as the joy that the faithful have reached the midpoint of Advent.

The white candle is placed in the middle of the wreath and lit on Christmas Eve. This candle is called the "Christ Candle" and represents the life of Christ. The colour white is for purity—because Christ is our sinless, pure Saviour.
