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Which of the two sons did his father's will?



Dear brothers and sisters,

Today's Scripture passages tell us of our relationship with God as we respond to His call in our life and God's fairness and loving compassion. We are free to say 'yes' or 'no' to God. However, the readings forewarn us that even though it is on us to make the ultimate decision for or against God at every moment in our life, we have to be aware that we are accountable for the decisions and life that we live. In the first reading, Ezekiel replies to the objection raised by the Jewish slaves in Babylon, "Our ancestors sinned, but we are punished, and so God is not fair!" Thus, God's message through His prophet is that His mercy overrules strict justice, and He doesn't hold our past against us. Hence, if God is "not fair," it is to our advantage, because as He doesn't hold the past against us, he always gives us another chance. In the same chapter of Ezekiel, God returns this "not fair" accusation, asking the House of Israel if their ways are "fair" when they turn from God's love to serve false gods and their own false sense of what life is.

"Which of the two sons did his father's will?" In the gospel reading of today, we are called to reflect on the father and owner of the vineyard who asked his two sons, "Son, go out and work in the vineyard today" (Mt. 21:29). The first said "no", I will not go" and but later went after he repented. The second son said "yes" for sure, I will go", but did not go.

Dear friends, what we say and do are very important in life. Our yes should be yes at all times. However, if we have not been honest with ourselves, with others and with God, and if we have not been the man or woman of our words, it is never too late to have a change of heart, to repent, to ask for mercy and begin a new life of loving obedience. Our baptism calls us to be completely obedience to God. Above all, though, God is love. As disciples of Jesus, we are to demonstrate our obedience to God, and still be the loving compassionate face of God.

Trouble under obedience: "A companion of Francis of Assisi, Brother Juniper is remembered as a 'fool for Christ,' and there are all sorts of wild stories about his antics. He was notorious for constantly giving his possessions away and living with a winsomeness that sometimes got him in trouble. At one point he was ordered by a superior not to give away his outer garment to the beggars anymore. But it wasn't long before he met someone in need who asked him for some clothing. He said, 'My superior has told me under obedience not to give my clothing to anyone. But if you pull it off my back, I certainly will not prevent you.' "(Another version: "I can't give, but you can take.") (https://frtonyshomilies.com/).

May we continue to be the sheep who hear the voice of the Lord Jesus, may we have an inspired eye of the heart to see and recognise Christ in the events if life and follow him. Amen.



Background to the Uluru Statement from the Heart and proposed Indigenous Voice to Parliament

Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Peoples have lived in this land for many thousands of years, their cultural and spiritual connection to country expressed through their history, music, language, songs, art and dancing. Their custodianship is not recognised in the Australian Constitution, and a constitutionally enshrined Indigenous Voice to Parliament is proposed as a way to achieve this. This proposal was requested by those who gathered at Uluru and presented the Uluru Statement from the Heart in 2021. The Uluru Statement has been endorsed by all levels of Catholic leadership, including the Australian Catholic Bishops Conference and His Grace Archbishop Mark Coleridge.

The proposed Indigenous Voice to Parliament

What can you do? Please prayerfully consider your own position

Archbishop Mark certainly acknowledges that every Catholic should and will come to their own conclusions about their response to social issues such as this one. His statements on matters such as this are made in order to encourage the Catholic community to reflect on the Church's views on specific issues, not to mandate their response. The Archbishop fully respects that you will form your own conscience and make your own decision regarding this referendum.

All Catholics are urged to engage in the debate productively, respecting each other and accepting that people may, in good faith, have differing concerns and perspectives.

Another important step you can take is to read the information available for both sides of the debate so that you can make your own informed decision on how you might vote in the referendum. The conversations about reconciliation are sometimes difficult and there are many considerations in this complex situation. Please also remember our Indigenous brothers and sisters in prayer during this time.

RCIA stands for Rite of Christian Initiation for Adults. It is the Catholic Church's way of initiating new members. RCIA is much more than a programme. It is a learning and loving process in which conversion of the heart bring one to Jesus Christ.

RCIA is an opportunity:

- for those who have not been baptised
- for those who have been baptised, but have little affiliation with, and/or training in the Catholic Religion
- for those who want to learn and ask questions about the Catholic Faith.

Through weekly meetings, those attending gain a deeper appreciation and understanding of the Catholic beliefs and practices. All are welcome and there is no obligation to make any commitment to become Catholic.

Feel free to invite:

- those who may be searching
- those who have never been baptised as Christians
- those who have been baptised in another Christian faith tradition and are now interested in the Catholic Faith
- those who were baptised in the Catholic Faith but did not receive First Communion, and/or Confirmation
- those Catholics who have been away and now might have questions about the Catholic Faith.

What is the Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults (RCIA) and what does it have to do with you? The RCIA is a journey - a process of conversion both for a person who is interested in becoming Catholic or for a baptised Catholic who would like to refresh their journey of faith.

Most Catholics experienced the process of becoming Catholic in a gradual way: baptised as an infant, we grew up in Catholic homes, with a Catholic education, and came to share in the Sacramental life of the Church as we grew up. The RCIA becomes an opportunity to ask ourselves what the real meaning of our faith is - and how we share that faith with others. Others come to the Catholic Church as adults. Some are already baptised Catholic, but without religious formation; some are baptised in another faith tradition; and some have never been baptised. Adults interested in the Catholic Church come to us because they were invited by a spouse, a fiancée, friend, neighbour or parishioner. Some are reluctant to take that first step - to approach the priest, or deacon, or call the Parish Office - but often they do come when someone is willing to INVITE them. So please start inviting. Alternately, if you'd prefer, let us know and we can contact them on your behalf.
