23rd July 2023 — 16th Sunday Ordinary Time — Year A

Dear sisters and brothers, in the first and gospel readings of today we see a God who is most powerful and yet calm, patient, compassionate with His creation. He does not hastily intervene, judge, and punish those who disobey His commandments and do all kind of evil against others as we would have done just to fix things without fully weighing the consequences. This is the message of the first parable in the gospel reading - the wheat and weeds. We live in a world where good and evil co-exist. We still have to be patient and wise in the choices we make every day of our life.

A better world can come through spiritual conversion and individual encounter with God the Holy Spirit. This is what St Paul reminds us in the second reading, that God's Spirit constantly empowers us in our prayers and in our weakness. By learning patience and loving compassion from our God and praying in the Holy Spirit, the kingdom and reign of God will grow in us like the parables of the mustard seed and the leaven teach us. Dear friends, God recognises that there is evil in the world, but at the same time, He sees that evil is no excuse for the good people not to do good with the power of God at their disposal. Jesus calls us through the parables to be open to the power of the Holy Spirit and be patient when our efforts produce little result and with those who seem to us to fail to meet the high ethical standard expected of a Christian.

First Holy Communion News

What does it mean for your child to celebrate his/her First Holy Communion

Now that first Communion time is upon us, families and children will soon be planning for their First Communion outfits, their first communion cake and the party. They will plan to dress up in their fanciest white dresses and crispiest white shirts just for this special occasion while their parents plan for their family gatherings and big celebrations. But... there is more to the event than the pretty white dresses or a smart white suit and a Communion cake and party.

While First Communion is indeed such a beautiful occasion for celebration and should be memorable and special, the true point of that holy and beautiful day must remain the *Sacrament of the Eucharist as the children are welcomed to the Table of the Lord*. We just remind the children and parents that this is this is our focus, this is what is central to our faith and this is why we do it. It can be a challenge to keep focused on the meaning of First Communion rather than all the trimmings. The key is:- good, solid, basic **catechesis**.

I try to tell all parents at meetings if their child's first Communion is their best Communion, then we have failed in what we are doing. True, this is the children's first time, but people seem to forget that the children will be receiving the sacrament every time they go to Communion – that is, every Sunday.

An essential part of First Communion preparation is attending mass especially on the Sundays chosen for the families, as it provides a basis for the children to build up their knowledge and their experience about the mass and its parts. An additional opportunity for catechesis is the retreat (in Retreat and Practice) held for both the children and their parents before the celebration of First Communion. While the retreat brings them together, the follow up is just as important. We give the parents the materials and the books, and they are responsible for going through them with the children at home. We make it clear that they are the first educators in their children's faith. The schools also follow up during religious education classes.

The retreat day for the children — "a Jesus Day" — is geared toward helping them understand the meaning of their first Communion. The entire retreat is focused on Jesus and the Eucharist explained, and it includes different activities focussing on the special day coming up. At the practice session, they also get to sample the bread and, in the days before Covid, the wine too.

I wish all parents to see that they are bringing their children to the Table of the Lord, that they are now initiated into the Eucharistic community, which has the honour and privilege of celebrating the sacrifice of the Lord and our subsequent salvation! That includes the intimate experience of Christ through receiving Jesus' body and blood. There is really no frilly white dress or shirt, cake or the party after that could truly beat that.
