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It's not Flesh or Blood that revealed this to you, but my **Father in Heaven**



Who Do People Say the Son of Man is? But, who Do You Say that I AM?

In a sense, the question above could be seen as Jesus' opinion poll to see what people's perception of Him was. However, it was not an opinion poll aimed at helping Jesus to adjust His approach and message to suit the aspirations of the people. Rather it was meant to shake off any remaining trappings of the people's popular and wrong opinions onto which the disciples were still holding strongly.

The story and the questions have to be put side by side with the location to understand what Jesus wanted to teach His disciples through that query. Jesus put the questions "who do people say the Son of man is", "But, who do you say that I am" in Caesarea Philippi, which is in the north of the sea of Galilee. I remember when I visited this site during a pilgrimage in 2013. It is a very scenic beautiful place. The place was just as the Jewish historian, Josephus, described it: "It is prodigiously deep, and full of still water. Over it hangs a vast mountain, and under the Cavern arise the Springs of the River Jordan." (Josephus, 37AD – C.100 AD)

Apart from the incredible beauty of this site, Caesarea Philippi is a place that hosted different temples to different gods around the 3rd century BC and traces of the ruins of these ancient temples are found there today. The original name was Paneas (now, Banias - an Arabic corruption of Paneas). Paneas took its name from the Greek god of nature called "PAN" and a grotto of Pan was put in the temple built in the cave and dedicated to this god. A temple was also dedicated in the honour of "Zeus" by emperor Trajan and there were other altars dedicated to other deities. It can be said that it was a valley of temples. Around 20 BC when the Romans conquered the place, Herod named it Caesarea Philippi in honour of Ceasar Augustus and consequently built a temple in honour of Ceasar.

It was not coincidence that Jesus chose to ask His disciples who do you say that I am in Caesarea Philippi where people worshipped gods that cannot save. The question serves to know the extent that the disciples have moved from popular opinions to listening to what God is saying to them about the Messiah.

When Peter said "You are the Christ, the Son of the Living God", Jesus said "Yes! Peter, it is not flesh or blood that revealed this to you but my Father in heaven. You are Peter and upon this rock I will build my church, and the gate of the underworld will not hold out against it". There and then, Jesus made Peter the head and overseer of the Church and first among equals and symbol of unity with authority to loose and bind. He created the apostolic succession too and promised to be with the church until the end of time.

Today Jesus is asking you and me "who do you say I am?" We must answer this not from an academic knowledge or what we have been taught, but by listening in our hearts what God is telling us about Jesus, our connection with Him and personal experience and encounter with Jesus in the power of the Holy Spirit. What is your relationship with Jesus like?

The proposed Indigenous Voice to Parliament

Background to the Uluru Statement from the Heart and proposed Indigenous Voice to Parliament

Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Peoples have lived in this land for many thousands of years, their cultural and spiritual connection to country expressed through their history, music, language, songs, art and dancing. Their custodianship is not recognised in the Australian Constitution, and a constitutionally enshrined Indigenous Voice to Parliament is proposed as a way to achieve this. This proposal was requested by those who gathered at Uluru and presented the Uluru Statement from the Heart in 2021. The Uluru Statement has been endorsed by all levels of Catholic leadership, including the Australian Catholic Bishops Conference and His Grace Archbishop Mark Coleridge.

What can you do? Please prayerfully consider your own position

Archbishop Mark certainly acknowledges that every Catholic should and will come to their own conclusions about their response to social issues such as this one. His statements on matters such as this are made in order to encourage the Catholic community to reflect on the Church's views on specific issues, not to mandate their response. The Archbishop fully respects that you will form your own conscience and make your own decision regarding this referendum.

All Catholics are urged to engage in the debate productively, respecting each other and accepting that people may, in good faith, have differing concerns and perspectives.

Another important step you can take is to read the information available for both sides of the debate so that you can make your own informed decision on how you might vote in the referendum. First Communion promises.... A Heavenly Banquet with God forever

Sometimes, we can take the everyday ordinary things for granted, like sharing a meal with the family, the beauty of the day or the season, ... and perhaps even the Eucharist that we share every Sunday. Now that the Eucharist Sacramental preparation and First Communion has been celebrated, if we are to truly comprehend the splendour and magnitude of God coming to us in the Holy Eucharist and what an immense gift the Lord is to us, we would be struck by awe and wonder!

Do you remember the first time you held your baby in your arms? What about when your baby they took the first step? Of course, you would, but your child isn't likely to remember it. Their First Communion Day, though, they will! At our First Communion Retreat and Practice day, there is a pronouncement that I make to the children. "You will remember your First Communion Day for the rest of your life." At Parent Information Sessions, I ask the parents if they remember their own First Communion. I see heads nod and hands go up. Many decades later, I still remember mine, all in white, long and fancy, veiled and gloved and the white cake my Mum made with pink icing on the top in the shape of the rosary beads. I remember my white veil that was my Mum's own wedding veil. All my sisters and my brother's daughters wore that same lace veil, my own daughter wore it at her First Communion and so did my granddaughter! I remember knowing this was a huge deal! But not as big as the Eucharist itself! The deeper meaning of Eucharist is something we grow into, and is a bigger deal than the day itself, however wonderful it is. How can we take in the beauty, power and awesomeness of Eucharist? It happens over time. It is enough on that special day to know that it nourishes the love between our child and God.

The Eucharist is a Sacrament of Initiation and First Communion is another step in the walk of a Catholic. We become part of the God's family at Baptism, and now our children are old enough to join us at Mass and receive the Body of Christ. We believe they have enough understanding to celebrate what Jesus did for us through His death and resurrection. He gained for us forgiveness for our sins and opened the way for us to eternal life. Eucharist is what Jesus told his followers to do to remember Him. The First Communions we celebrated in the past two weekends are an opportunity for us to appreciate the gift of Jesus to us in the Eucharist. Eucharist enables us to remember and deepen our relationship with Jesus Christ. The Eucharist is always at the very heart of Catholic spiritual life. In Eucharist, we remember God's continued faithfulness in Jesus' death and resurrection. It is a meal of gratitude. This is what Eucharist means: *Thanksgiving*. It's a covenant meal renewing, again and again, God's promise that He is our God, and we are God's people.

We celebrate the Eucharist in joyful moments and sad, in great Cathedrals and in simple Churches, in camps and school halls, by the great and the humble, with big crowds or with only a few. It is the same Lord who comes to us no matter what the circumstance or the occasion. Sometimes, as parents, we say one thing but we really mean another. When we say, "Go clean your teeth," we mean "Learn clean habits." When we say, "Take care," we mean, "You're precious to me." Furthermore, a message we hope to be very clear in bringing our children to their First Communion and sharing Mass together is to say, "God loves you. I love you. In the Eucharist, God will always be with you."

It is a privilege to be able to support families and celebrate First Communion. The Lord comes to us Sacramentally to be "our Bread for the journey" to prepare us for the world to come, the eternal life we are promised in Baptism. The Eucharist is the promise of the "Heavenly Banquet" with God forever. May we appreciate and treasure the gift of the Lord to us in the Eucharist and make our Sunday Eucharist a priority in our lives.

Congratulations to all our 70 children who celebrated in the last two weeks in our parishes. Our thanks to Father Iheme who celebrated all our masses during the programme, who solely did the second rite of Reconciliation and celebrated all our First Communion masses. My deep gratitude to Helen Radley and Gay Clements whose huge help in delivering the programme to the families, marking books, training the children and conducting the Retreat and the Practice cannot be overlooked. Thank you to the families who brought the programme to fruition for to the children. Thank you to our volunteer parents who helped mark the books, who collected materials, paper work and who marked the roll. Thank you to all who have helped with the Liturgy, Music Ministry, flowers in the church, the Sacristans, PowerPoint producers, our readers, Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion, our photographer and our beautiful hardworking Parish office staff. Thank you so much and God bless you all in your ministries.
