7th January 2024 — Year B — The Epiphany of the Lord

Dear Sisters and Brothers,

Today we celebrate the feast of the Epiphany of the Lord. This feast reminds us of the first revelation of Jesus to the world after His birth. The three wise men from the east embarked on a journey, led by the star to see the newborn king, Jesus Christ, and pay Him homage. They offered Jesus gold and frankincense (signifying Jesus' kingship and priestly ministries) and myrrh (signifying that His body will not see decay).

The Magi's journey to find Jesus symbolises the spiritual journey of seeking truth and the need for persistent faith and commitment in the search for divine revelation and God. It teaches us important lessons on our spiritual journey and the need for a faithful search of God amidst the ordinary under the guidance of the holy scripture. This search needs faith, for reason alone cannot lead one to the divine truth and God. A notable Benedictine monk and influential theologian, St Anselm of Canterbury, in his works, "The Proslogion," discussed extensively the idea that faith precedes reason. For him it is not a denial of

reason and its power to know things, but that reason or intellectual knowledge cannot lead to divine comprehensive truths nor to God.

In one of his writings, a pray titled: "A rousing of the mind to the contemplation of God", Anselm captured his strong conviction that one can attain a deeper understanding of God and divine truth by embracing a belief in God. Part of the prayer reads: "... Lord, you are my God and my Lord, and never have I seen you. You have created me and recreated me and you have given me all the good things I possess, and still I do not know you... Look upon us, Lord; hear us, enlighten us, show yourself to us... Have pity upon our efforts and our strivings towards you, for we can avail nothing without you. Teach me to seek you, and reveal yourself to me as I seek, because I can neither seek you if you do not teach me how, nor find you unless you reveal yourself. Let me seek you in desiring you; let me desire you in seeking you; let me find you in loving you; let me love you in finding you."

Here, Anselm sees faith as the gateway to divine wisdom and truth. From this, Anselm posits that by recognising the existence of God and surrendering to His divine presence, individuals can embark on consistent journey of spiritual enlightenment.

Today's Gospel has much to teach us about our own faith journey. There will be moments when things are clear and moments when we are confused and lost, just like in the case of the Magi. What is important is that we persevered even in the dark nights of the mind and confusion, for the Lord will come to our aid even through ordinary means if we let Him guide us. Dear friends, we are called to be consistent and never give up in our search (faith journey), and to faithfully listen to the voice of the holy scripture, which is our own guiding star. In this, God speaks to us still today.

Just as the wise men went to Herod's house, we too might occasionally find ourselves searching for God in the wrong places and consequently failing to find Him. Sometimes, we are deceived and sweet talked into things that do not give true fulfilment and lasting joy - worse still into giving up on God and faith. The question for each of us is where does one ask for direction when the way is no longer clear? Is it from the present-day Herods or God? In our search for meaning in life, for truth love, joy and happiness let us put faith and the word of God at the centre of our journey.

KBCC Solidarity with the Catholic Parish of St Therese, Kiritimati, Republic of Kiribati

Dear brothers and sisters in the Lord, I would like to inform you that our community, Kedron Brook Catholic Community, has decided to journey in solidarity with the Kiritimati Catholic Parish Project on Kiritimati. This community is one of our closest neighbours in the Pacific region. In a letter from Father Tara-jake Takakia, who looks after the church, the parish is appealing to groups and individuals to support their Parish Project on Ronton Kiritimati. The project is to erect some Eco-friendly single house units or Bungalows (called Little Flower Guest House) over the lagoon in Ronton, which will serve as guest houses for tourists or fish anglers. If this dream is realised, it will be a source of revenue for the Kiritimati Parish Catholic Church. It will also provide employment opportunities to the people who will work as tour guides, boatmen, cleaners, chefs and drivers.

The first phase of the project is to construct the first five units of the "Guest House" estimated to cost \$120,000 AUD. The Catholic Parish in Kiritimati has saved \$20,000 AUD and is seeking interested donors and supporters to come to their aid to make the dream a reality by 2024-2025. As a parish community, our combined Pastoral Council, with the support of the Finance Councils, has agreed to support this endeavour and raise at least \$10,000 AUD in 2024. As a result, all money raised in our Christmas raffles will go to this project. Also, we are looking at other ways of raising the money and would appreciate donations to the Kiritimati appeal fund.

The Celebration of the Feast of the Epiphany (Reference: The Filipino Heritage 1977)

Epiphany, also known as the Feast of the Magi, is celebrated in many ways around the world. In Western Christianity, the feast of the Epiphany celebrates the arrival of the Magi. May I share with you a little about how we celebrate the Feast of the Epiphany in my culture. In the Philippines, the day is celebrated with gift giving, a holy procession and a re-enactment of the Three Wise Men's journey.

When I was a child, my siblings and I used to put out our best shoes on the evening of the 5th January, which also happened to be my Mum's birthday. We hoped that gifts of gold, perfume or clothes would be left with those shoes lined up at the door in keeping with the magi's gifts to our Lord. Many times, we received special delights and our wishes were fulfilled...I won't tell what we got but it always left us with a smile!! There is nothing like the excitement of leaving your shoes by the door on the eve of the Epiphany! It's a tradition that encapsulates the essence of giving and reminds us about the joy of simple surprises.

Epiphany, is one of those special dates in the Christian calendar that doesn't get as much limelight as Christmas or Easter. But in the Philippines, it has the glitz and drama to make it a Hollywood blockbuster! It's that time of the year when the Magi play starring roles, and the topic is their epic road trip without a GPS, following a bright star. Their destination was Bethlehem to meet the infant Jesus and shower Him with special lavish gifts. As early as the Spanish colonial era, Filipinos have been observing this day with much commitment. Our ancestors integrated the holy observance of the Three Kings with local customs, making it as traditionally Filipino as they can. From vibrant processions to special church masses, the Feast of the Epiphany became more than just a holy day; it became a cultural celebration, a testimony to our unique blend of faith and festivity. In country towns in the Philippines, the tale of the Wise Kings comes alive in lively parades with colourful costumes, the Magi on horseback and the children, dressed as angels and shepherds, join the procession, adding to the gleeful spirit. The streets energised with music, songs and dance and the vibrance of a community in celebration. The processions end up at the Church where special masses are held and the story of the Magi's visit is retold. The faithful are reminded of the manifestation of Jesus as the Son of God. The scent of incense permeates, hymns resound, and prayers are lifted up. Communities gather for gratitude and worship.

After mass, there is a gathering for a Filipino foodfest. Tables are laden with traditional dishes of "pancit" (fried noodles), "adobo" (soy and vinegar stewed chicken), "bibingka" (sticky rice cake) and "lechon" (pig in a spit). Families and friends get together for a hearty meal, sharing stories and laughter. It's a time of togetherness, of food and company.

In the Philippines, the Feast of the Epiphany is not just a religious celebration. It's a quilt woven together by faith, culture and tradition, sewn by the threads of community and celebration. Also as the last residues of the Christmas season, it's a beautiful reminder of warmth and joy that defines the Filipino spirit.
