YOU ARE THE "NEW ISRAEL" CALLED TO BE FRUITFUL

The image of "Vineyard" cuts across all the readings of today's readings, except in the second reading, which highlights and brings out a main theme that is fruitfulness that is at the heart of and common to all the readings today. The images tell us how God value us as His people and what is expected of us. Hence today we are reminded of the significance of bearing fruit in the Christian life.

The first reading from prophet *Isaiah, the house of Israel is the Vineyard of the Lord that God loves.* The prophet went on to describe how God's care for, and support of, his vineyard, His Chosen People Israel, to bear good fruit in relation to the love and blessings that God has lavished upon her. However, disappointingly, God's Chosen People have failed to bear fruit in spite of the blessings that Lord of Host has lavished upon them. They prove themselves to have been poor tenants in the Lord's vineyard. Hence, in the gospel, God laments: *"I expected my vineyard to yield good grapes. Why did it yield sour grapes instead?"* God was disappointed at the unfaithfulness of, and lack of fruits by, the chosen people.

In the gospel, though, Jesus took up the image of the vineyard with a contrast. In the first reading, Isaiah says that the vineyard will be destroyed for its inability to bear fruit after the love and care lavished upon her. Jesus, on the other hand, in the gospel declared that the wicked and untrustworthy tenants will be replaced and the vineyard kept. God never gives up on us, even when we stayed away and reject Him. The Psalmist captured this in the Responsorial Psalm (Ps 80). The Psalmist pleads with God to look down from Heaven and to *"take care of this vine,"* knowing that if any good is to come of the vine, it will be the doing of God, not the people.

My dear friends, God has called us as the "new Israel" and people of God in Christ Jesus. We are called to be a fruitful vineyard. Through baptism, we received the love and grace of God necessary for bearing fruits of love, peace, obedience to God and mercy. Yes, God is love and compassion, but we need not take God and His words for granted, for there is consequent accountability for every action both loving ones and those of spiritual sterility, ingratitude, and wickedness.

Let us take some time today to reflect on the central theme of "fruitfulness" for the kingdom of God, to which every Christian is called. St Paul tells his Philippian community and us by extension that they (we) need to become fruit-producing Christians. It is a call to us Christians – the "new Israel" – to practice the biblical values of justice, love, purity, faith and graciousness every day of our lives. These are the marks of an authentic follower of Christ Jesus.

The proposed Indigenous Voice to Parliament

Background to the Uluru Statement from the Heart and proposed Indigenous Voice to Parliament

Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Peoples have lived in this land for many thousands of years, their cultural and spiritual connection to country expressed through their history, music, language, songs, art and dancing. Their custodianship is not recognised in the Australian Constitution, and a constitutionally enshrined Indigenous Voice to Parliament is proposed as a way to achieve this. This proposal was requested by those who gathered at Uluru and presented the Uluru Statement from the Heart in 2021. The Uluru Statement has been endorsed by all levels of Catholic leadership, including the Australian Catholic Bishops Conference and His Grace Archbishop Mark Coleridge.

What can you do? Please prayerfully consider your own position

Archbishop Mark certainly acknowledges that every Catholic should and will come to their own conclusions about their response to social issues such as this one. His statements on matters such as this are made in order to encourage the Catholic community to reflect on the Church's views on specific issues, not to mandate their response. The Archbishop fully respects that you will form your own conscience and make your own decision regarding this referendum.

All Catholics are urged to engage in the debate productively, respecting each other and accepting that people may, in good faith, have differing concerns and perspectives.

Another important step you can take is to read the information available for both sides of the debate so that you can make your own informed decision on how you might vote in the referendum. BECOMING A CATHOLIC



Every September and October in our Parish, we call for interest from non-Catholics if they wish to become Catholic. As a result, a group of adults gather to begin that process. We begin meeting regularly after primary interviews, "meet and greet", informal chats and conversations. We then move on to the Rite of Acceptance late in January into the Catechumenate stage toward Lent and the Easter Vigil when Baptism, Confirmation and Eucharist are celebrated.

What is RCIA?

The RCIA is the Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults, a **process** through which non-baptised men and women enter the Catholic Church. It is in several stages marked by study, prayer and rites at Mass. Participants in the RCIA are known as catechumens. They go through the process of conversion as they study the Gospel, profess faith in Jesus and the Catholic Church, and receive the sacraments of Baptism, Confirmation and Holy Eucharist. Sometimes, even those baptised in another faith come and join us.

What are the steps of the RCIA?

Prior to beginning the RCIA process, an individual comes to some knowledge of Jesus Christ, considers his or her relationship with Jesus Christ and is attracted in some way to the Catholic Church. This time is known as the **Period of Evangelisation**. After study and conversations with the RCIA team or the Parish Priest, the inquirers decide to be accepted into the Catholic Church. The period of the catechumenate can last for as long as several months... maybe years. During this time, the catechumens consider what God is saying to them in the scriptures, what changes in their lives they want to make to respond to God's inspiration, and what membership in the Catholic Church involves. We have several meetings and many conversations and discussions and we celebrate with the inquirers at the Rite of Acceptance sometime in the new year.

When both the catechumen and the parish RCIA team believe they are ready to make a faith commitment to Jesus and the Catholic Church, the next step is the celebration of the **Rite of Election**. This rite includes the enrolment of names of all those seeking Baptism at the coming Easter Vigil. On the first Sunday of Lent, the catechumens and their sponsors usually gather at St Stephen's Cathedral and the catechumens publicly request Baptism. Their names are recorded in a book and they are called "the elect." The days of Lent are the final period of **purification and enlightenment** leading up to the celebration of initiation at the Easter Vigil. Lent is a period of preparation marked by prayer, study, and spiritual direction for the elect, and prayers for them by the parish communities.

The third step is the **Celebration of the Sacraments of Initiation**, which takes place during the Easter Vigil Liturgy on Holy Saturday when they receive the sacraments of Baptism, Confirmation and Holy Eucharist. Here our Elect become fully initiated members of the Catholic Church.

After they are initiated, formation continues in the **post Initiation catechesis**, which is called "mystagogy." This continues at least until Pentecost. During this time, they reflect on their experiences at the Easter Vigil and learn more about the scriptures, the sacraments, and the teachings of the Catholic Church. In addition to this, they reflect on how they will serve Christ to help in the church's mission and outreach activities.

Please pray for our inquirers. This is very important time for them and for us in the Parish. I'd also like to ask if anyone is interested to join our RCIA Team, we are excited to hear from you.
