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My flesh is real food and My blood is real drink

My flesh is real food indeed and My blood is drink indeed

This Sunday the Church presents us with the "bread of life" discourse of Jesus Christ as recorded in John's Gospel (Jn. 6:51-58), which is part of a broad and lengthy teaching of Jesus after the miracle of the multiplicity of the bread. The image of Jesus as "bread from heaven" echoes two dimensions of the same Old Testament image of the wisdom of God's Law nourishing everyone who accepts it and God's blessing of manna that fed the Israelites journeying through the wilderness to the promised land. Consequently, the feast of the "Most Holy Body and Blood of Jesus" is intended to make us believe in, and value with reverence, Jesus in the Holy Eucharist.

The Church clearly teaches that the Eucharist is at the heart and centre of our faith, it is the source and summit of Christian life. Jesus is truly and really present in the Holy Communion that we receive and is reserved in the tabernacle, both in body, soul and divinity. This great fundamental change of the bread and wine into the body and blood of Jesus Christ after the words of consecration at mass is called transubstantiation. The real presence comes about by the power of the words of Jesus when he took the bread and said this is my body and for the wine, this is my blood (Mt. 26:26-28). Thus, He spoke His presence into them. The big and million-dollar question is "do you believe in the real presence of Jesus in the Holy Communion we receive and adore?" According to a Pew Research, it was shocking that 69% of Catholics (in USA) do not believe in the Church's teaching on transubstantiation. Sadly, they wrongly believe the Eucharist is mere symbolism. On the other hand, among those who go to mass regularly (weekly), even though 63% know and accepts the church's teaching on transubstantiation, 37% of this most observant group don't believe in transubstantiation or real presence. If similar research is conducted here in Australia, I think that the statistics won't be much different from that of America.

There are different factors that contributed to this situation, among which are people not making an effort to learn the faith plus a lack of interest and an effective way of teaching the 'real presence' by many of the clergy and ministry leaders, coupled with the way we treat with lack of reverence the "Holy Communion".

However we don't need to be trapped in the past failure, we must reconnect with the Church's teaching and ask the Eucharistic Jesus to revive us. In the gospel we hear Jesus say, "My flesh is food indeed and my blood is drink indeed," and before that, He said "you will not have eternal life unless you eat my flesh and drink my blood." Can we take it to heart today and know that it is not just the church telling us something, but Jesus commanding us "eat my body and drink my blood" (Jn. 6:22-26)? This includes giving it the reverence, the adoration and the worship it deserves, and teaching others too. We receive truly Jesus Christ in the Eucharist for our own spiritual good and salvation. St Paul added that all who receive the Eucharist must do so in faith and holiness bearing in mind that it is Christ's body and blood (1 Cor. 11:27-30). If we are not worthy because of sin, we have to find the courage and go to confession. Holy Eucharist is not a "happy hour" time.

Today's solemnity reminds us through the second reading also of the link between the one Bread and one Cup that we receive, and the indispensable companionship with one another. We are called to emulate Christ's sacrificial love and share it through solidarity with others.

'Is God a man or a woman?', 9-year-old Lexa, my granddaughter, asks me one afternoon as I open our confirmation session for their questions.

Other questions pop up: 'How do you explain the Trinity, Papu?' 'What does 'made in the image and likeness of God' mean?' my young girls confidently ask.

I feel privileged, as a grandfather, to catch such deep faith questions innocently dropping from their lips. I don't have the correct answers; instead, I realise that God has blessed me with the patience and understanding of heart to respond to the purity of their minds adequately.

Confirmation in Brisbane, Australia is administered at nine years, compared to 13 years in the Philippines. Further, it comes with intensive preparation, complete with a Confirmation workbook and required parent orientation sessions in the parish, as it is a joint effort with the Catholic school.

My interactions allowed me to see how kids see Jesus and how they understand the faith. This is how for example, 11-year-old Nala tells the story of Jesus's encounter with a leper in one of the Bible's healing episodes. This was supposedly her favourite Bible story. She begins by saying, 'In Jesus' time, lepers were hated because their leprosy sickness was contagious. Because of this, their families kicked them out of the house...'

From her workbook, I read 7-year-old Aria's account of 'Jesus Carrying the Cross.' She says, 'Once, Jesus was forced to carry the cross. But before He could carry the cross, He had to have thorns on His head...' Amusing and funny, but true and accurate to the child! In another exercise, the girls were made to draw their understanding of how the Holy Spirit works after a brief on His being a source of empowerment. This was how the 9-year-old twins took to the task:

Lexa, the younger twin, writes: 'The Holy Spirit helps me soar high! It follows me and guides me to where I need to be. Even if I don't see it, I know it will always be there.' The older twin, Anya, sees it from another angle. She draws a pinwheel and writes beside it: 'I am the pinwheel and the Holy Spirit, the wind. It can move me to do great things!' Straight and simple, a child's mind embraces!

I am fascinated by the child's profound take on faith, devoid of all the complexities with which the world's teaching systems have clouded it. No wonder the Lord enjoined children to come to Him freely! I enjoy the moments of their asking 'to connect the dots' in their uncomplicated minds.

I am reminded here of Pope Francis' exhortation that grandparents like us 'pray for the visit of an angel,' through whom God sends us messages and affirms us of His presence as He has promised, 'I will always be with you!'
