**If you only knew what
God is offering**



“Give me a drink”

This gospel passage from John 4:5-42, about Jesus and the Samaritan woman at the Jacob's "Well" is one of the most iconic encounters in the scriptures. It portrays the human Jesus, who was weak, tired and thirsty after a long journey from Jerusalem to Galilee after the festival of Passover (cf. Jn 2: 13-25; 3:22; 4:3). When they got to the town of Sychar in Samaria, Jesus sat down at "Jacob's Well" to rest. The disciples of Jesus had gone into the town to buy food when the woman from Samaria came to draw water at odd hours (midday) alone. Some believe that this was probably because she had acquired a bad name in the community, because of her unstable and broken relationships. She was regarded as a social outcast.

Who are the Samaritans? At the time of Prophet Isaiah, and following the death of King Solomon, Israel had divided into the northern kingdom called Israel (with the city of Samaria as its capital) and the southern kingdom called Judah (with Jerusalem as its capital). All the invaders – (Assyrian, Babylonian, and Roman invaders) had always gained a foothold in the Jewish land through "the north", which was the trade and river routes. When the Assyrians (superpower at the time) attacked and conquered the northern region around the sea of Galilee in 720 BC, they spared the southern kingdom as they did not join the rebellion. The Assyrians forced the people of Zebulun and Naphtali tribes who lived in the northern region into the process of enculturation and paganisation. This the Assyrians did by forcing them into intermarriage, and the descendants of these intermarriages became the despised Samaritans of Jesus' day.

As the Samaritan woman approached the well, Jesus said to her, "Give me a drink". With this request, Jesus opened a lengthy salvific conversation with the woman. It is interesting to point out that we were not told the woman's name, which means that the conversation that we read today was not just about her, but it is very much about us in different ways. The conversation that Jesus started as a needy person turned to be one of faith that led to deep conversion for the woman. In the preface of this Sunday, the church wrote: "For when he asked the Samaritan woman for water to drink, he had already created the gift of faith within her and so ardently did he thirst for her faith, that he kindled in her the fire of divine love." As St John Paul II stated, "Jesus' material thirst symbolises a far deeper reality: it expresses His ardent desire that His dialogue partner and her fellow-citizens will open themselves to faith."

The truth is that we are all thirsty for something. But the good news is that Jesus is thirsty too. As human beings, we thirst for good health, love, for solidarity, understanding, beautiful and stable relationships. But most times when these thirsts are not met, it leads many into depression, anxiety, hurtful feelings, sense of loss, isolation, and the feeling of rejection. Nonetheless the most intense thirst is that caused by the absence of God in one's life.

My dear friends, God always takes the first step. "Give me a drink" is Jesus' request for our relationship. Jesus thirsts for our soul, faith, and love. Accepting His request opens to us the spring of life - living water. The 1st and Gospel readings reassure us that in every human thirst and its effects, God always show Himself as loving, caring and merciful. Lent helps us to encounter Jesus and to make us aware of our emptiness without Him. As we journey with Jesus during this holy season, may our emptiness be filled through the presence and power of the Holy Spirit - the "living water" that quenches every thirst.

THIRD SUNDAY OF LENT—11th & 12th MARCH 2023

Climate change continues to bring unprecedented challenges for people living in the most vulnerable and remote communities in Zimbabwe.



Priscilla lives with her husband and two grandchildren in the Hwange region. With the support of Caritas Hwange, Priscilla and her community learnt conservation farming to grow drought-resistant crops. Her increased harvest allowed Priscilla to sell her crops and start poultry farming, selling eggs to grow her income stream and pay for her grandchildren's education. Caritas Hwange also helped rehabilitate the dip tank in her community so that Priscilla's cattle can be healthy and free from tick-borne diseases. While the situation in Zimbabwe and across eastern Africa remains dire, the work of Caritas Hwange has helped Priscilla acquire the knowledge and skills she needs to diversify her income and support her family during the current food crisis. "Today we have knowledge and skills that we didn't have before and are able to use to earn a living," Priscilla said.
