21st May 2023 — The Ascension of the Lord — Year A

Priority: Implementing Integral Ecology (Acts 1:1 - 11, Psalm 46:2 – 3, 6 - 9, Eph 1:17 - 23, John 14:15-21)

Introduction: Consider for a moment the following question: what is the Church's mission? On this Solemnity of the Ascension of the Lord, the Gospel reading provides us with an answer. Jesus says, "Go, therefore, and make disciples of all the nations." What is the Church's mission? To make disciples of Jesus. Recent Popes have continued to remind us of this central mission. Pope Paul VI said that the Church "exists in order to evangelize" (EN 14), and Pope Francis wrote that "in all its activities the parish encourages and trains its members to be evangelizers" (EG 28). If the Church exists to make disciples, we must consider what is a disciple, and how do we make disciples? This is interconnected with the sixth apostolic priority: Implementing Integral Ecology.

Archbishop Mark writes:

Natural and human ecology interact in mysterious and unmistakable ways. To interfere with one is to interfere with the other; to promote the good of one is to promote the good of the other. Fratelli Tutti (a recent Papal Encyclical) focuses more upon human ecology in speaking of the radical interconnectedness of all human beings at a moment when alienation and polarisation are making disconnectedness seem the norm. The Church is called in such a moment to be a sign of contradiction, speaking in a way that rises above politics and economics so that a genuinely biblical and Christian voice can be heard.

1. What is a Disciple? ...In the first reading we see that the disciples had a personal relationship with Jesus. They didn't just know him, they also followed him, and allowed him to transform their lives. This is a challenge to all of us. Do we have a personal relationship with Jesus? Do we follow Jesus? Do we allow Jesus to transform our lives? ... To be a disciple is to be filled with the Holy Spirit... Beyond this, St Paul reminds us to, "be filled with the Spirit, as you sing psalms and hymns and spiritual songs" (Eph 5:18-19).

The second reading provides further insight into the work of the Spirit which enables us to see God, ourselves and the earth with a new vision. With hearts enlightened by the Spirit we are able to see the immeasurable greatness of God, the wonder and dignity of every person as being made in the image of God, and the beauty and majesty of the earth which shouts of the glory of God. Hearts enlightened by the Spirit "realize that a true ecological approach *always* becomes a social approach; it must integrate questions of justice in debates on the environment, so as to hear *both the cry of the earth and the cry of the poor*" (Laudato Si, 49). It is the encounter with Jesus that inspires the love of God, each other and creation.

2. How do we make disciples? ... When Jesus called his disciples, he said he'd make them fishers of people. In the Gospel today he calls his disciples to go and do just that – to make disciples! Each of us, all the baptised, are called and commissioned to make more disciples... Making disciples means walking in the empowerment of the Spirit received in confirmation to courageously share our faith, hope and love with others. This is not about proselytizing. Jesus never coerced anyone to follow him. It is instead an invitation to others that begins with sharing the joy found in the enlightened heart that can see immeasurable greatness of God, the wonder of God's image upon every human person, and the fingerprints of God on all of creation.



Conclusion: Today our Lord calls each of us to go on mission, but let us first consider our own journey as a disciple of Jesus. Have we personally encountered Jesus, and have we allowed Jesus the freedom to move in our hearts and transform our lives? Are we walking in the grace of our baptism and the empowerment of the Spirit received in confirmation? Let us first ask Jesus to again lead us, guide us, and help us on our journey as his disciple... Finally, in light of implementing integral ecology, let us pray that as we help others encounter Jesus, that the Spirit would enlighten hearts to see the interconnectedness of all of creation in order that a conversion to Christ leads also to an ecological conversion that transforms hearts and minds toward a greater love of God, each other and creation.

After Confirmation is done, what's next...

Congratulations! Your child has celebrated the sacrament of Confirmation, they have been sealed with the same Holy Spirit who moved upon the watery void of Genesis and charged the hearts of Jesus' disciples at Pentecost almost 2,000 years ago!

But... now what?

When a your young person is confirmed in our modern world, it can certainly *feel* like a "graduation." With their beautiful dresses, fancy suits, and family after-parties, it surely seems like the "end" of something. There are no more workshops to attend, so now you may think "phew, gone past the mandatory workshop stuff."

Sometimes, as Catholics, we rely too heavily on programmes and classroom-like structures, thinking that in *learning* about our Christian faith we're also **living** our Christian faith. Yes, like it is said...we should all be life-long learners, but so much of being a fully mature disciple is in the participating, in the "doing" of being a disciple: charging up with prayer, sharing the Scriptures and what Jesus Christ has done for us, helping out and serving those in our community, etc.

Therefore, Confirmation is not the end of our Sacramental journey but the **beginning**! Confirmation, that special sealing of the Holy Spirit upon our young people, should be the beginning of maturing discipleship. The workshops may be over, but now the great big job of being Jesus' disciples begins!

We all have specific gifts and talents that God wants us to use. Your specific action of sharing your gifts and talents is always more influential and compelling than any kind of writing, book, or internet phenomenon. We must have confidence in what God wants us to do even through our own fragility and deficiency before we begin to call that courage out of our confirmed young people.

As a parent, teach your children the importance and the impact of prayer in their lives. Try to reach out to your child's sponsor, keeping them in the loop about your child's life, their big and small wins, their struggles, and reminding them to help with their own prayers. Ask them to call or text their newly confirmed loved one at regular intervals to invite them to attend Mass with you on a weekend, or join you for brunch and conversation.

As a parent or a sponsor consider some of these guiding questions based on Chosen Sponsor Guide (Ascension Press): Have you created a routine of prayer? What kinds of prayer do you like? What times of day are best for you to pray? (Share what has worked for you in your past!)

- What are some areas of the faith you want to learn more about?
- Do you feel connected to your parish life? What can you do to stay connected?
- How do you think Christ wants you to witness His love at your school?
