28th May 2023 — Pentecost — Year A

Pentecost Priority: Embedding Synodal Governance (Acts 2:1 - 11, Psalm 103:1, 24, 29-31, 24, 1 Cor 12:3 - 7, 12 - 13, John 20:10 - 23)

Introduction: Have you ever been in a situation where you're the only person who doesn't speak the language that everyone is talking? ... Whether it was intentional or not, you are inevitably excluded. On this great celebration of Pentecost, we turn our attention to the birth of a truly inclusive Church and what this kind of inclusion means for the seventh and final apostolic priority: Embedding Synodal Governance.

Archbishop Mark writes:

We have begun the long and complex process of moving towards a synodal mode of governance in the Church, but the process is far from complete; and there is much to be done to embed synodal governance more securely at every level in the Archdiocese... Synodality implies inclusion, and therefore we will have to keep asking how we might at every level include women in the decision-making processes of the Archdiocese. So too synodality requires transparency and accountability, and we will have to keep asking what we need to do to make the Archdiocese more transparent and accountable.

- 1. An Inclusive Church is Born: In today's first reading, Luke chronicles the descent of the Holy Spirit at Pentecost. There is a sound like a violent wind, tongues of fire appearing on the heads of the Apostles, and they begin speaking in other languages... The significance of this cannot be overstated. The Spirit of God was moving through the Apostles so that every tribe and nation could hear the Gospel and be included in Christ... In a recent general audience, Pope Francis said "If the Church does not pray to and invoke the Spirit, it closes in on itself, in sterile and exhausting debates, in wearisome polarisations, while the flame of mission is extinguished." This is a challenge to us all! Are we a community that is inspired and empowered by the Holy Spirit? Do new people feel welcomed and connected when they join us at Mass? Do we communicate the Gospel with language that is relevant that can be understood by every generation?
- **2.** An Inclusive Leadership for an Inclusive Church:...In recent years, Pope Francis has been encouraging this with reference to the word "synodality."... Synodality is the process of walking together in open dialogue and mutual respect with a path deliberately journeying not aimlessly wandering about. Pope Francis said that a "synodal Church is a Church which listens, which realizes that listening is more than simply hearing. It is a mutual listening in which everyone has something to learn...
- **3.** A Church with One Body and Many Parts: In the second reading, St Paul explains that every baptised person is "given the manifestation of the Spirit for the common good." This means that everyone has something unique to offer the Church and the world. Being Catholic means more than coming to Mass. At Pentecost we are reminded that all of us are called to the mission of Christ to make disciples. The Holy Spirit has empowered each of us to contribute to this mission. So, we're invited today to consider how God might be calling us and activating us to engage in this mission. What are the gifts the Holy Spirit has given to you? How can you bring these gifts to the service of the mission?

Conclusion: On this birthday of the Church,...We recognise that a truly inclusive Church must have truly inclusive leadership. This apostolic priority of embedding synodal governance challenges us all to go on a journey toward becoming a Church where the faithful people, the college of bishops, the Bishop of Rome are all listening to each other, and all listening to the Holy Spirit, the "Spirit of truth."

Vale Parry!

Parry has lived in the St Carthage's community for 56 years. Parry's tireless and dedicated tenure as volunteer with St Carthage's is well over 30 years. It began before the amalgamation of all the current parishes. Parry took over from Jane in producing the parish weekly newsletter. In those days it was typed by two fingers on a manual typewriter before I purchased him an electric typewriter. The original was then photocopied at the Church office one side at a time and then manually folded. After this, the computer age commenced and

Parry bought a computer and taught himself how to use it. He used Publisher to produce the weekly newsletter. This continued until the creation of the Good Samaritan Parish Office. In the early days Parry would produce 150 weekly newsletters, then down to 100 and finally approximately 60 copies a week. This came about partly with the loss of Saturday evening Mass. Easter and Christmas, Parry would produce 200 plus newsletters. This would take hours and at these times I assisted with the photocopying and folding. Parry in recent years would supply the weekly pictures for the current newsletter and also produce the Prayers of the Faithful for our parishes.

In the early days Parry was the Chair for the Parish Council for approximately 20 years. He would stoically, tirelessly and determinately voice his concerns, suggestions, etc. to the Archdiocese, the Archdishop or to whomever he believed would be able to action/change a decision about the Church in general or St Carthage's in particular.

Parry was involved in other roles such as a Counter, chief Rat Catcher for Fr Terry Madden, looking after Midnight the Cat when Fr Terry was away, etc.

Parry was often an instigator cum coordinator in the many St Carthage's events held in the "Starlight Restaurant" as it was commonly known - the large undercover area of the school. Many a convivial evening was held with plays written by Fr Terry and Paul Sherman and others.

When the projector was donated by a parishioner, Parry taught himself PowerPoint and would create and run the PowerPoint presentation each Sunday. His last PowerPoint presentation was the week before his passing. Even when in hospital, his concern was the PowerPoint for Ascension Sunday.

For many a year Parry would carry out the flower arrangements for the Special Feasts of Easter, Pentecost and Christmas etc. He planted chrysanthemums and the poinsettias at home to assist with flower costs. The flower arranging would take him hours. Self taught, he just got on with the job. Carol is now the flower arranger.

Parry's faith was evident in his life and the Church was his life. If he saw a job to be done in the Church, he would tackle it to the best of his ability regardless of the hours it might take him. When there was talk of possible Church closure after Fr Connelly's passing many a year ago, Parry tirelessly worked on keeping the faith community of St Carthage's going. It is now time for the baton to be passed on and for all to continue their existing roles and gather more in the fold of the St Carthage's faith community.
