MY YOKE IS EASY AND MY BURDEN LIGHT

It is said that life is not a bed of roses! Sometimes we all find life very burdensome. We have all gone through hard and difficult times in life at some point. The truth is that a burdensome life is not fun. Though some of our challenges, worries and burdens are consequences and effects of our actions or inactions, some are from forces over which we have no control. Interestingly, Jesus invites us to come to Him with our worries and burdens. Awesome! We all would want that, wouldn't we? However, why did Christ want to give us a different one rather than taking the burdens away from us completely?

Well, being a disciple of Jesus does not take us out of the human realities and experiences, neither does it immune us from worries, disappointments, and the burdens of life. The invitation of Jesus, rather, is an invitation aimed at rekindling hope and a reassurance of God's loving compassion and readiness to help and walk with us shoulder to shoulder through the challenges of life. God always wants our peace, and it is in Him that we will find rest.

In John 14:27, Jesus said: "Peace I leave with you; my peace I give you. I do not give to you as the world gives. Do not let your hearts be troubled and do not be afraid". Unfortunately, when people have some worries and burden they resort to things like – the taking of drugs, promiscuity, alcohol, or simply giving up or descending into depression. By using the image of a yoke Jesus is telling us that there is hope, He is with us and ready to share our burden with us if we come to Him. He wants to help us and ultimately to give us peace.

He truly understands our worries and weakness in life and has the power to turn things around for us. Jesus invites us to cast and offload all our troubles on Him and in return He will give us His peace and the ability to carry His yoke, which is not only good for us but also easy. What is that yoke and burden that Jesus wants to give us to carry? It is the yoke and burden of patience, loving service and humility. Without humility, one wouldn't bring oneself to ask for help and one will eventually crack and break under the heavy burden. It is only love that can make a heavy burden light. His yoke of patience and hope strengthens us. We have the knowledge that God works all things together for the good of those who love Him (Rom. 8:28). As Flor McCarthy said, "While faith makes all things possible, love makes all things easy."

The Gospel of Service:

One of the "saints" of the Zen religion is a priest named Tetsugen, who was the first to translate the holy books of his Faith into Japanese. Many years ago, the priest sought to print several thousand copies of the books in order to make the texts of Japan's religion available to everyone. He travelled the length and breadth of Japan to raise the money for the printing. Rich and poor alike donated to the project. The priest expressed equal gratitude to each donor, whether their gift amounted to hundreds of pieces of gold or a few pennies. After ten long years, Tetsugen had enough money for the printing. But just as the making of the holy books was about to begin, the river Uji overflowed its banks, leaving thousands of people without food and shelter. The priest halted the project immediately and used all of the money he worked so hard to raise to help the hungry and homeless. Then Tetsugen began the work of raising the funds all over again. It took another ten years of travel and begging before he collected the money he needed to publish the holy book. But an epidemic spread across the country. Again, the priest gave away all he had collected to care for the sick, the suffering and dying. A third time Tetsugen set out on his travels and, twenty years later, his dream of having the holy books printed in Japanese was finally realised. The printing blocks that produced the first edition are on display at the Obaku Monastery in Kyoto. The Japanese tell their children that Tetsugen actually published three editions of the holy book; the first two are invisible, but far superior to the third. — Jesus invites us to embrace the joyful sense of fulfilment that can only be realised by "learning" from His example of humility and gratitude, to take on His "yoke" of humble, joyful service to one another as we journey together to the dwelling place of God. Like Tetsugen, we proclaim the Gospel most effectively and meaningfully not in words but in the generosity and compassion we extend to others. 

The Role of Parents is Important

Parents are the primary educators of their children. In celebrating Baptism of their babies, parents pronounce out aloud and make a commitment to forming their children in their faith life. Parents are spoken to by the Priest: "Parents you have asked to have your child to be baptised. In doing so you are accepting the responsibility of raising your child in the practice of the faith. It will be your duty to bring your child up to keep God's commandments as Christ taught us, by loving God and neighbour." (RB #39) Parents have firstly the right and their duty to be very closely involved in preparing their children for First Communion. Catholic catechism is there to help parents grow in their own understanding and appreciation of the Eucharist and so they can actively and readily participate in the catechising of their children (NCD #121). Parish and school programmes of religious formation assist parents in this most important responsibility but never take over the role of parents that is rightfully theirs. Your Child's READINESS:

When we talk about a child's readiness to celebrate a sacrament, there are three areas to consider: the family, the child and the parish community. The Family is the primary place of child formation. Parents are the role models for their children and therefore are encouraged to act as witnesses by their regular participation in church life within the parish. Here are some points to ponder on:

- Does your family participate in the life of the community in the areas of worship, service and formation?
- As parents are you willing to commit to the continuing formation of your child in worship, service and formation?
- Does your family pray together at home?
- Is your child baptised, confirmed and have you prepared your child to participate and celebrate fully in mass?
- Has your child expressed an interest or a desire to celebrate Eucharist?
- Does your child participate in the liturgy on a regular basis at the parish not just in school time or just at Family Masses?
- Does your child continue to be formed in faith including basic knowledge of who Jesus is and what He has done?
- Can your child distinguish Eucharist from ordinary bread?

As sacraments are commonly celebrated in community, the parish has a great responsibility in the sacramental preparation in partnership with parents.

Your parish provides the parents with the necessary support and information to enable you to fulfil your role as primary educator of your child. Your parish provides opportunities for lifelong faith formation through the masses, through children's liturgy, through prayer, through children's choir, through Family Masses in cooperation with the school, through Altar Servers Training, through Reader's Training and through the Sacramental Preparation.

The proper context for the celebration of the Sacraments is the parish community. A privileged time and place for the sacrament, namely Confirmation and First Eucharist, is the Sunday Mass. Immediate preparation for the sacraments involves Sacramental Preparation programmes supported by the Catholic School Religious Education programmes. Sacramental catechesis takes place during parent information meetings combined with parent/family prayers and rituals, family sacramental workshops and retreat time.

PREPARATION FOR THE SACRAMENT

Preparation for any sacrament is a journey of the heart that prepares us and the children most especially to meet the Risen Lord Jesus Christ. It involves a commitment to the Sacramental preparation, reflection, prayer, faith sharing and the ritual celebration with parents and other sacramental children. This is not an educational process or a time to "make up or catch up" on catechetical material. In the case of preparation for First Communion, if a child is lacking age appropriate foundational catechesis, then it might be suggested to hold back your child, or probably as parents to refresh your own knowledge, where you are in your faith journey, your own commitment to your practice of the faith and lastly your commitment relation with your child's faith journey. Immediate catechesis for the sacrament of Eucharist is to be short and focused on the preparation for the celebration of the sacrament. The goal of this catechesis is to help children participate in the Mass in a meaningful and reverent manner. The content of the preparation is to have at its core the format/structure of the Eucharistic celebration. Themes should include "sharing, listening, eating, conversing, giving, thanking and celebrating" (NCD #133).
